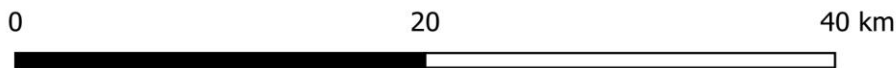
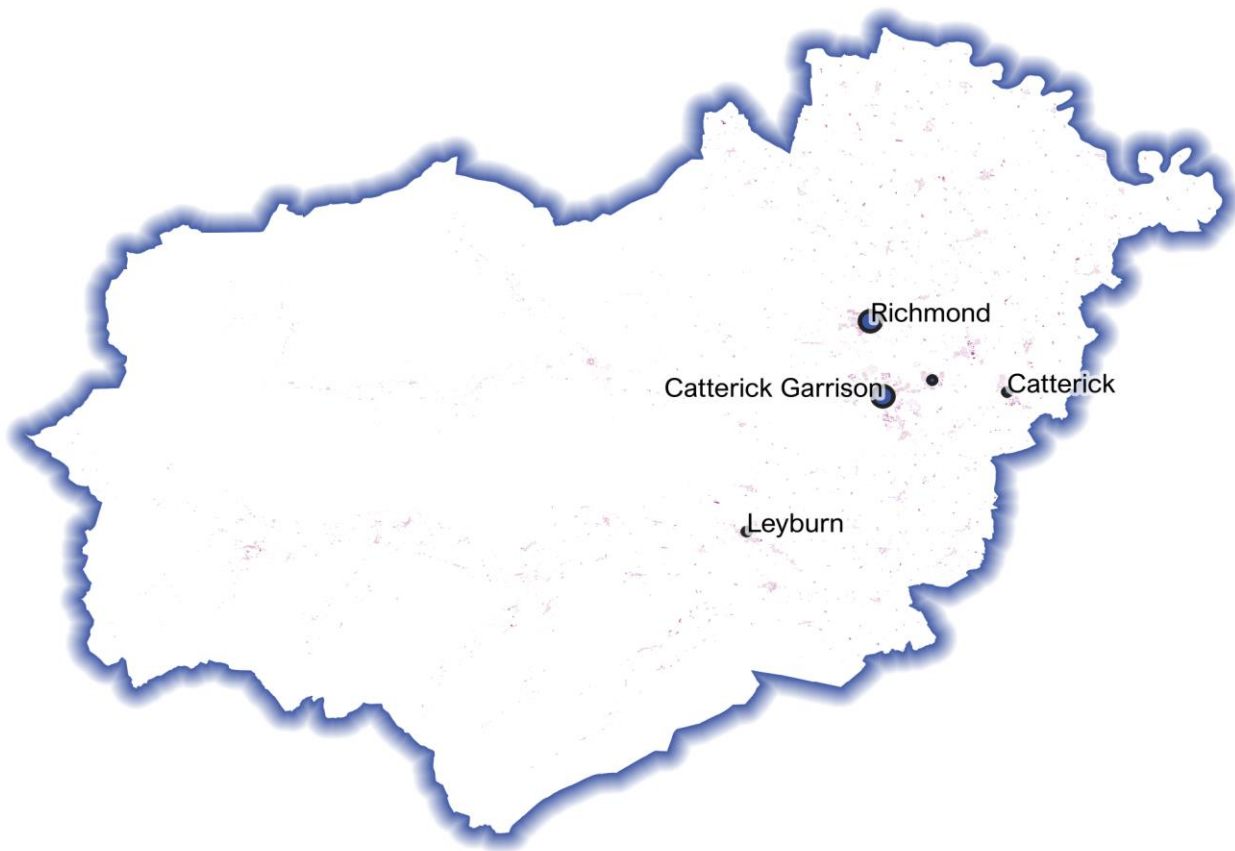

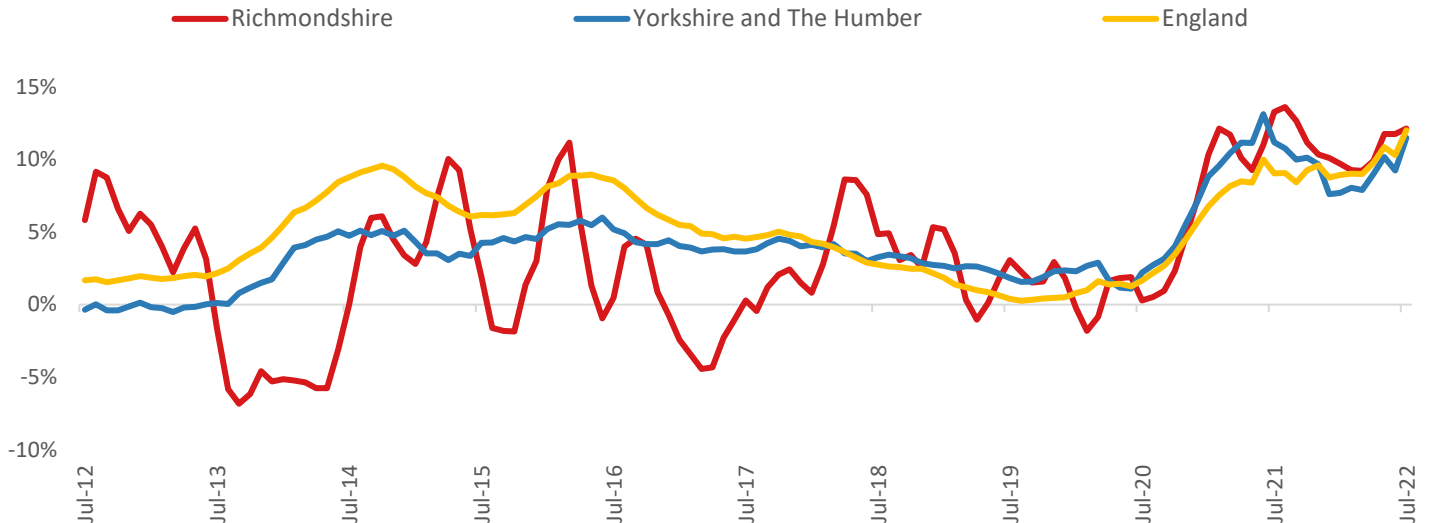

**House Price Growth (July 2022 data)**

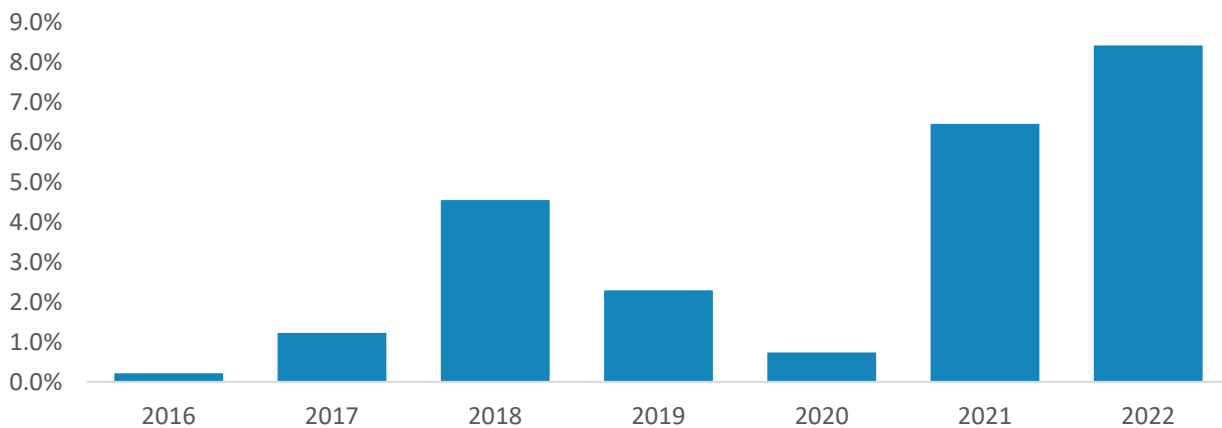
*Annual Change in House Prices*



House prices in Richmondshire grew by 12.1% in the 12 months to July 2022 (based on 3-month smoothed data). By comparison national house prices grew by 12.0% and prices in Yorkshire and The Humber grew by 11.5% over the same period.

Richmondshire house prices are now 31.4% above their previous peak in 2007, compared to +38.3% for Yorkshire and The Humber and +57.4% across England.

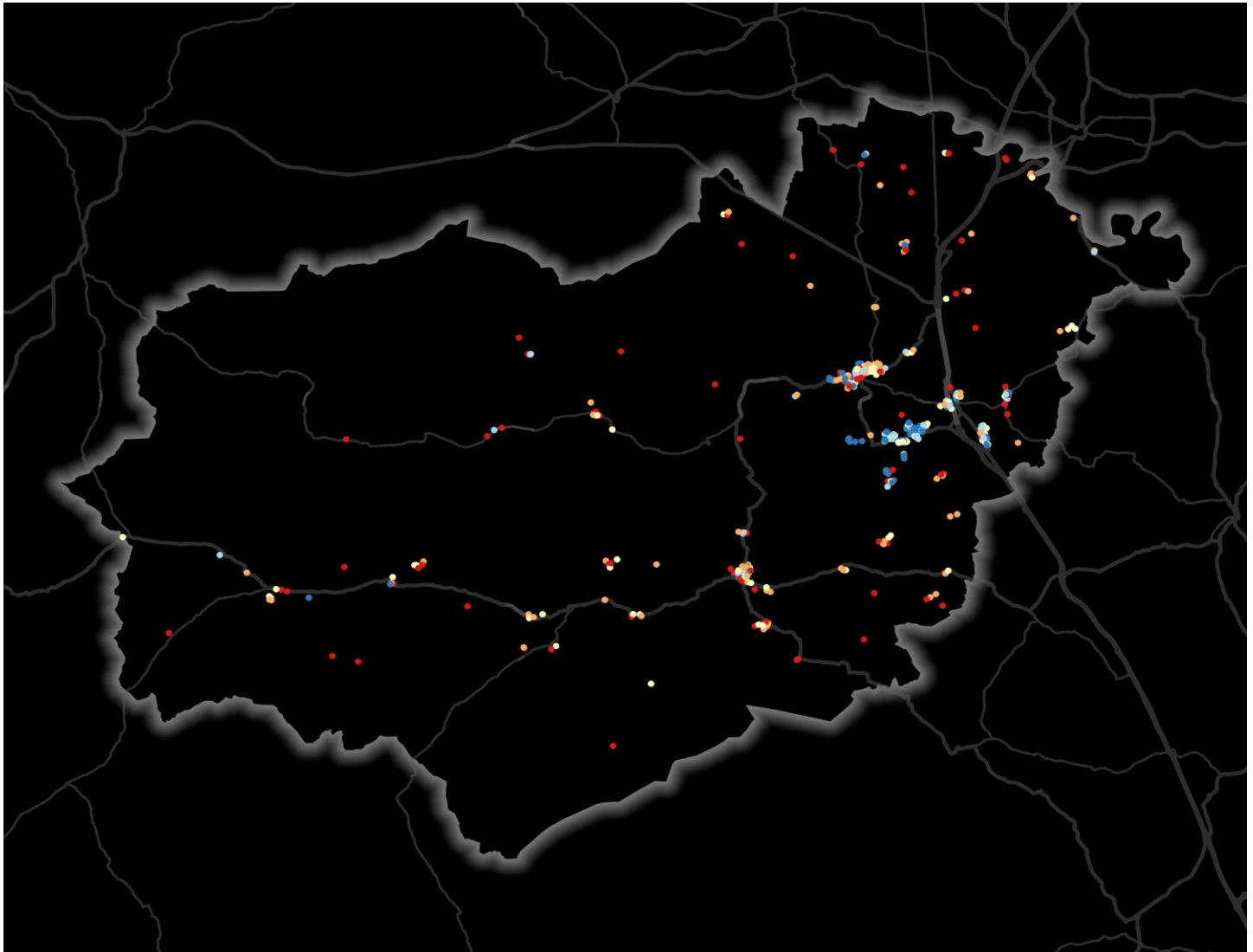
*Year-To-Date Change in House Prices, December to July*



Local prices have grown by 8.4% in 2022 so far, compared to growth of 6.4% over the same period last year.

Each point is one postcode, coloured by the average value relative to all sales in this local authority (price bands are LA-specific quintiles).

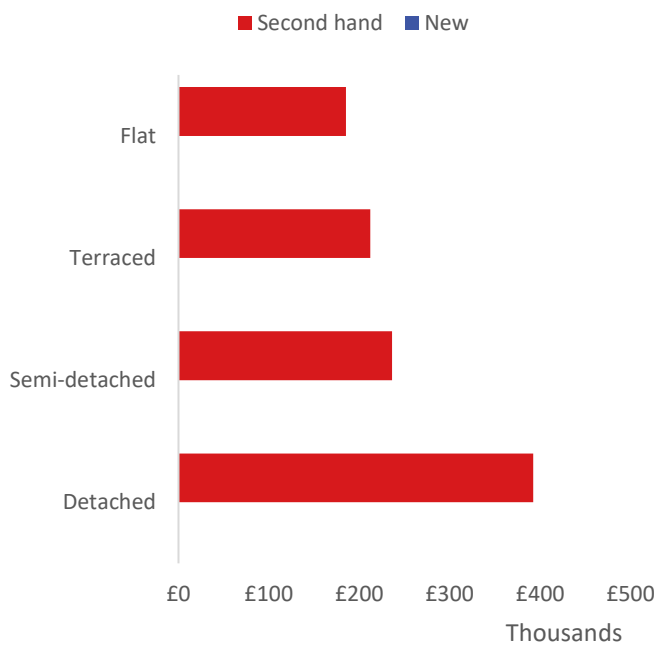

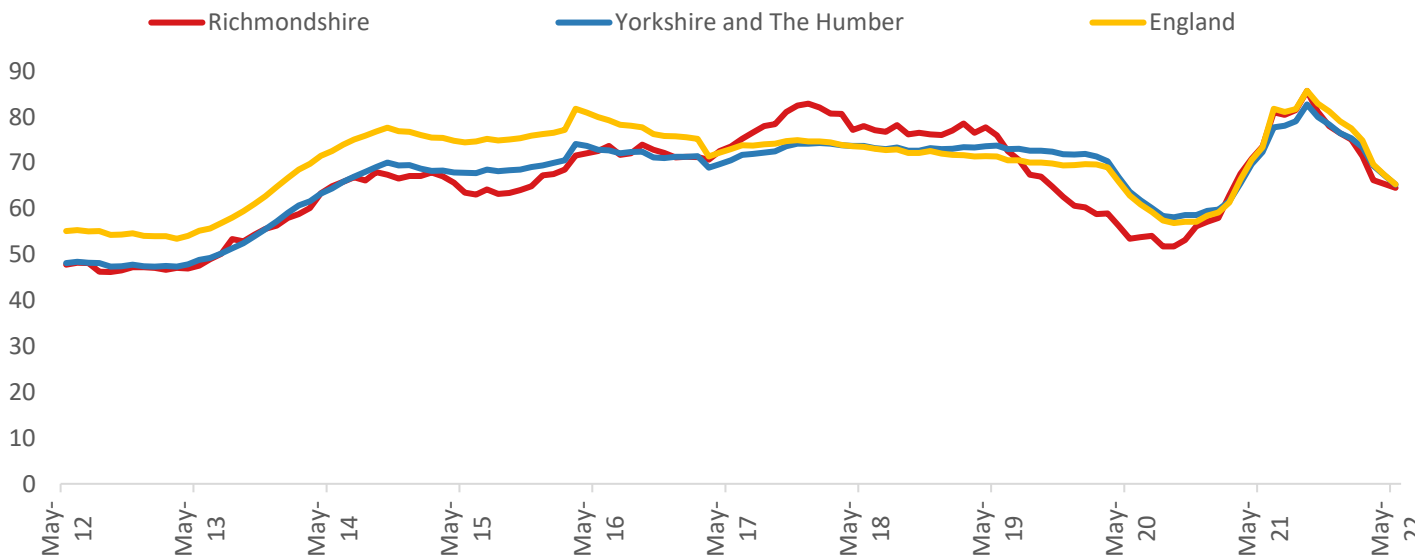

### Transactions (May 2022 data)

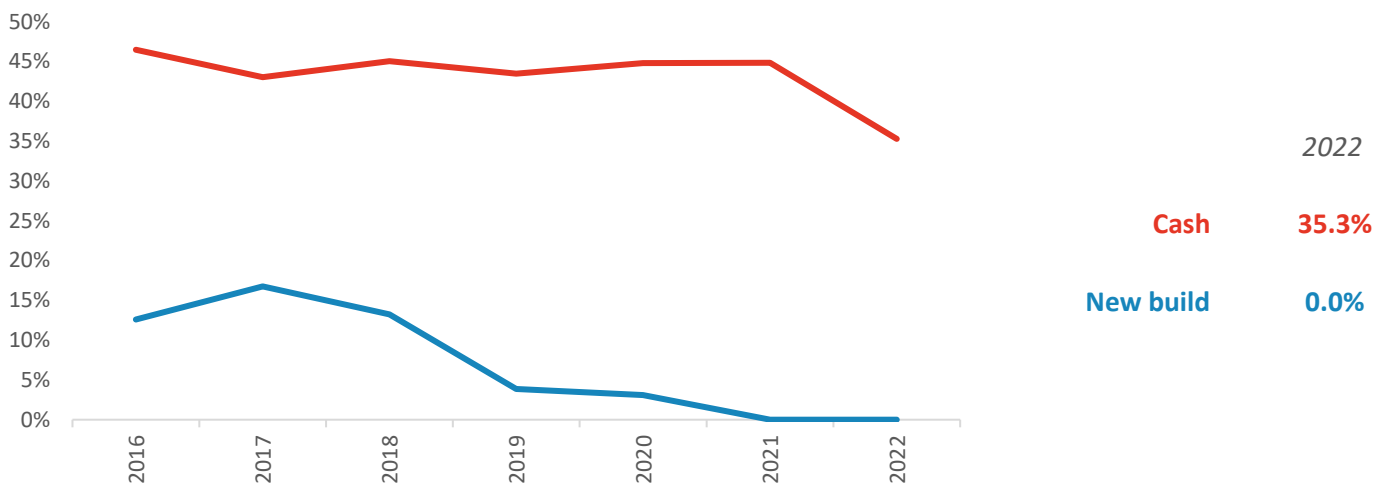
Annual Transactions, Indexed (2001-05 average = 100)



There were 693 transactions in Richmondshire during the 12 months to May 2022. This is 65% of the average from 2001-05 and suggests activity is significantly below pre-downturn levels.

Transactions in Richmondshire have fallen by 3.9% since 2014, compared to changes of -6.2% for Yorkshire and The Humber and -14.9% for England.

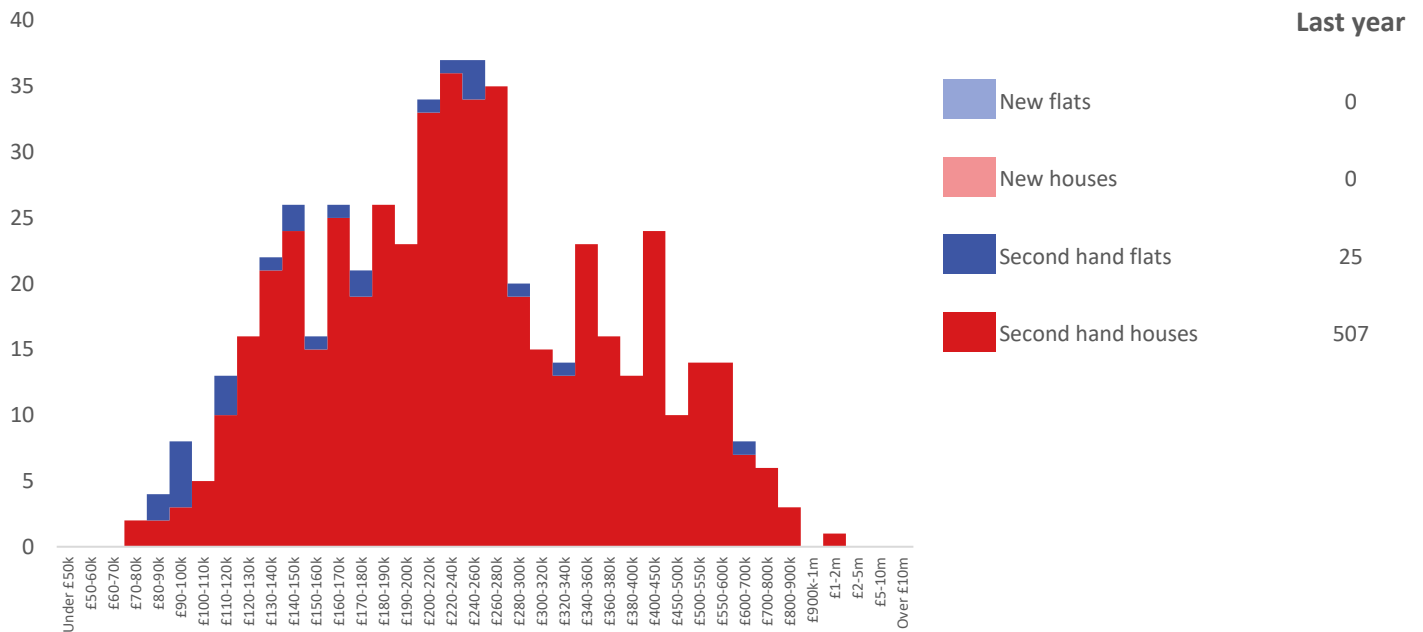
### Cash and New Build Sales as % of Total, by Year

## Depth of Market by Property Type

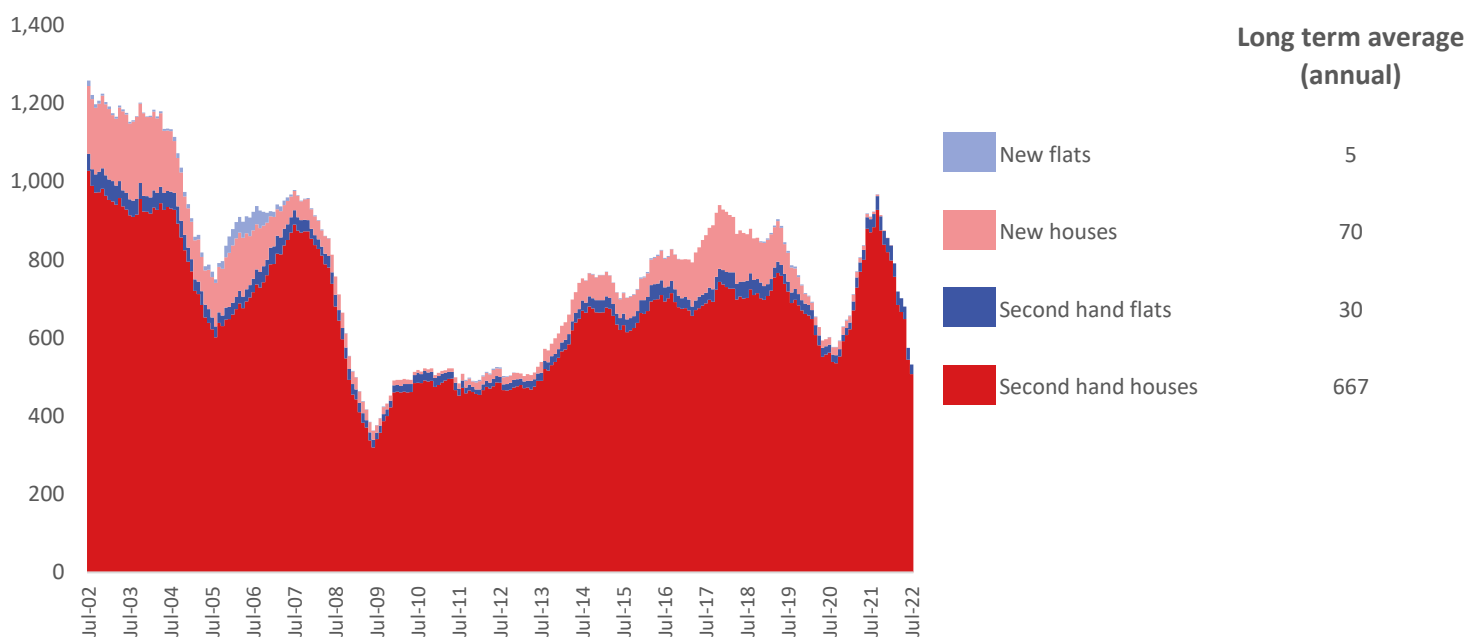
12 months to July 2022



The most common property type transacted over the past 12 months in Richmondshire was 'second hand houses' with 507 sales, 95% of all sales over the same period. The annual total of 532 transactions is equivalent to 69% of the long term average level of activity.

## Timeline of Transactions by Type

Rolling 12 months, past 20 years



The most common property type transacted over the past 20 years was 'second hand houses' with the equivalent of 667 sales per year on average, making up 86% of the typical annual total over that period.
