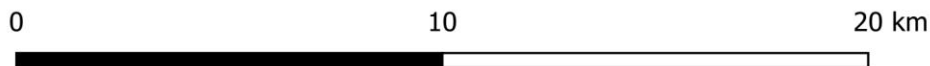
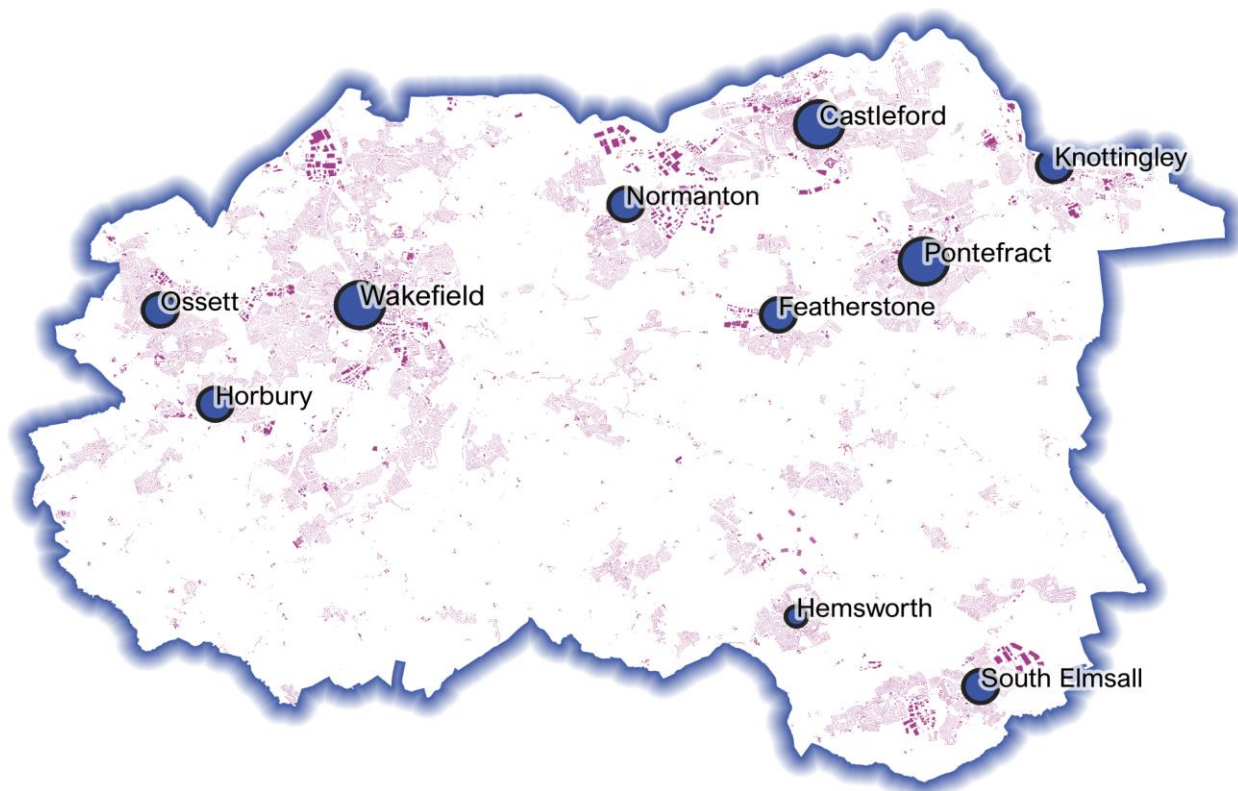

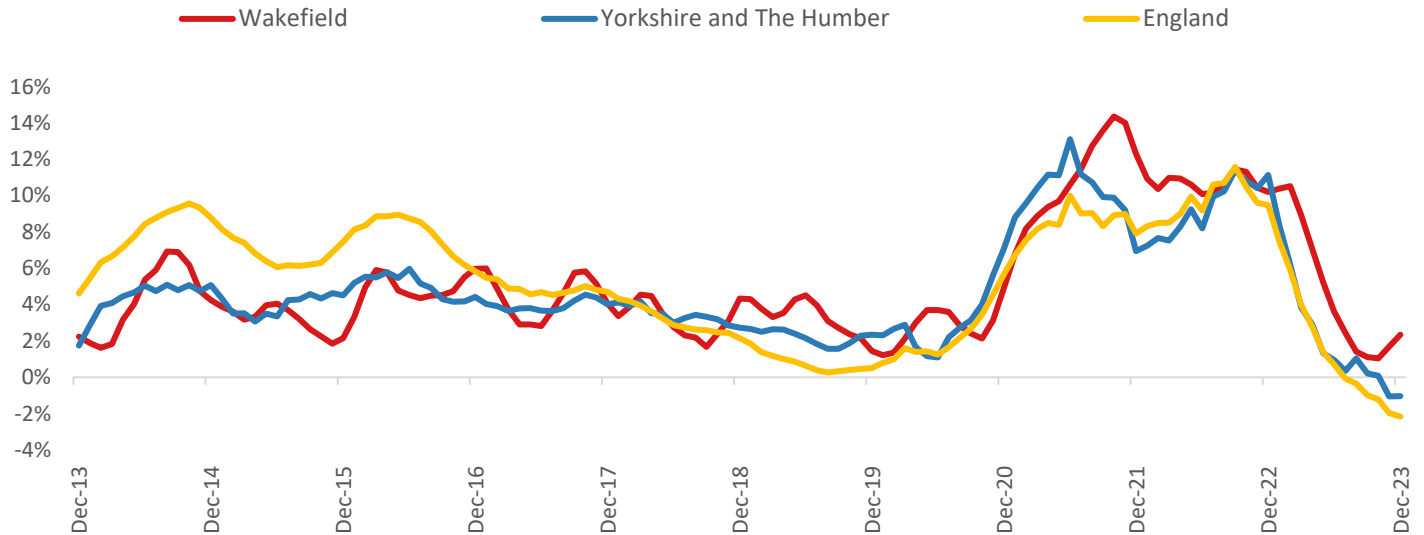

**House Price Growth (December 2023 data)**

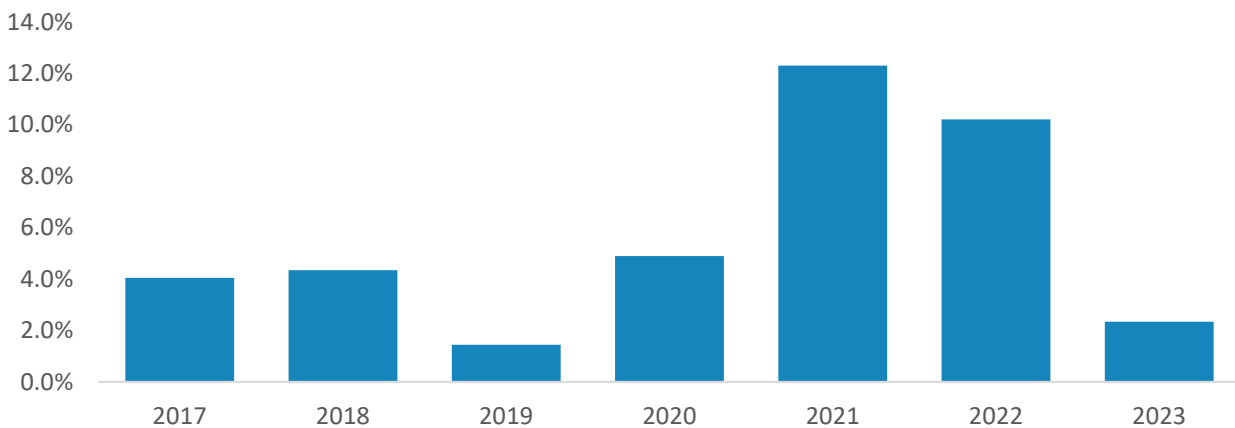
*Annual Change in House Prices*



House prices in Wakefield grew by 2.3% in the 12 months to December 2023 (based on 3-month smoothed data). By comparison national house prices fell by 2.2% and prices in Yorkshire and The Humber fell by 1.0% over the same period.

Wakefield house prices are now 37.3% above their previous peak in 2007, compared to +39.1% for Yorkshire and The Humber and +56.0% across England.

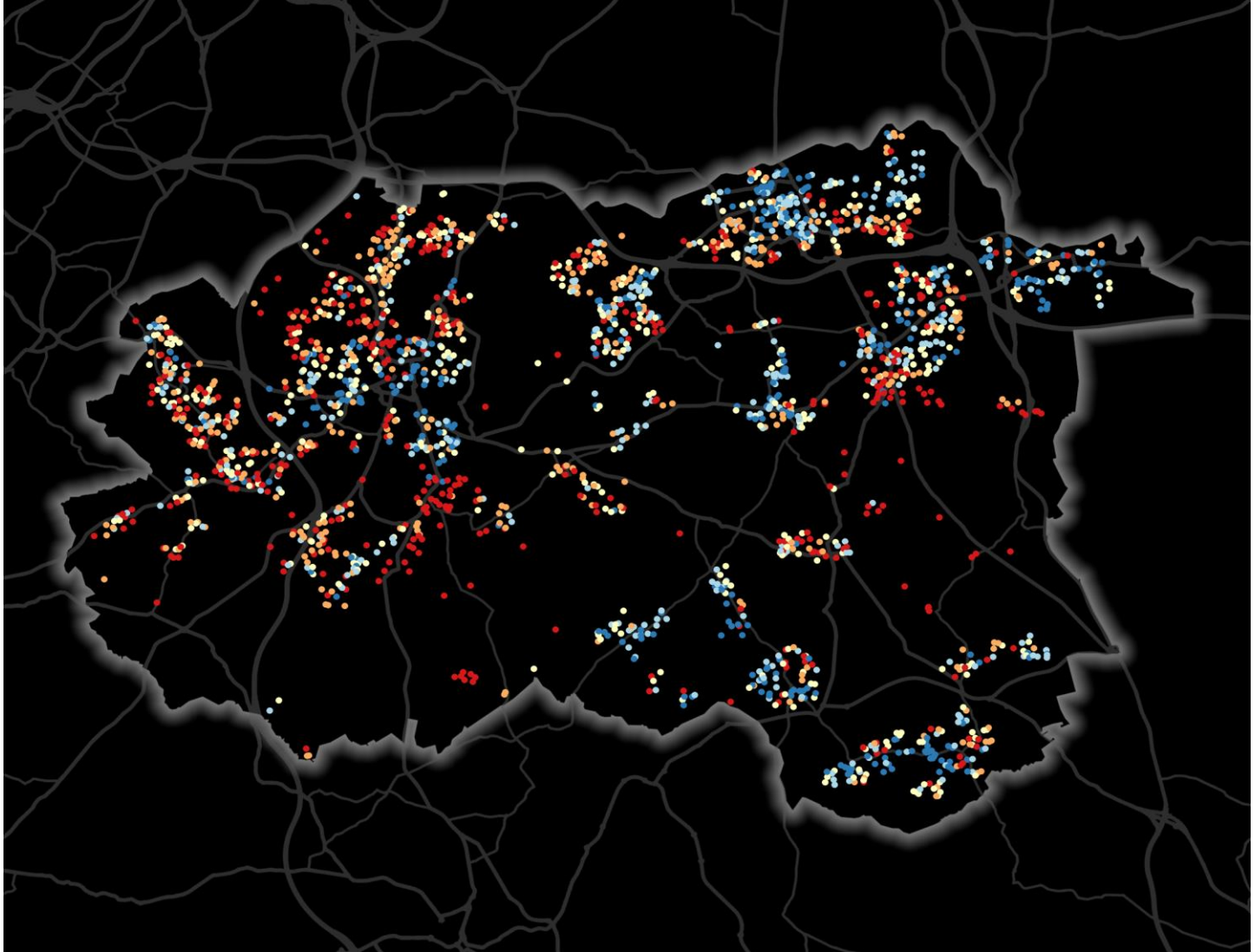
*Year-To-Date Change in House Prices, December to December*



Local prices have grown by 2.3% in 2023 so far, compared to growth of 10.2% over the same period in 2022.

Each point is one postcode, coloured by the average value relative to all sales in this local authority (price bands are LA-specific quintiles).

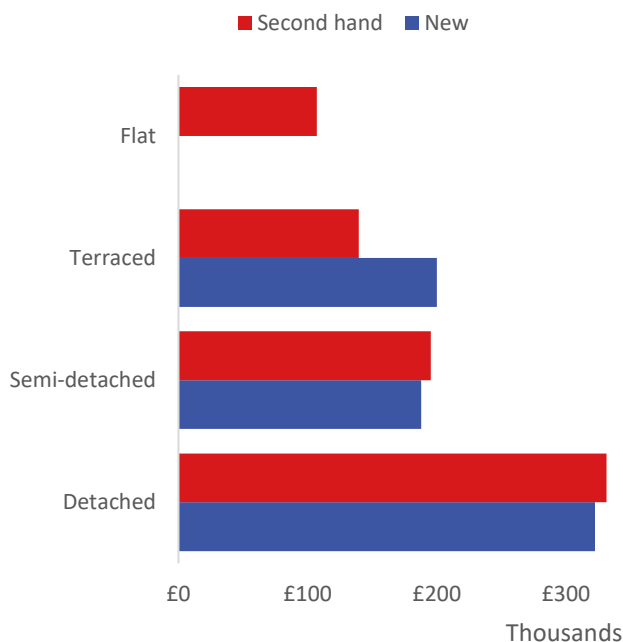

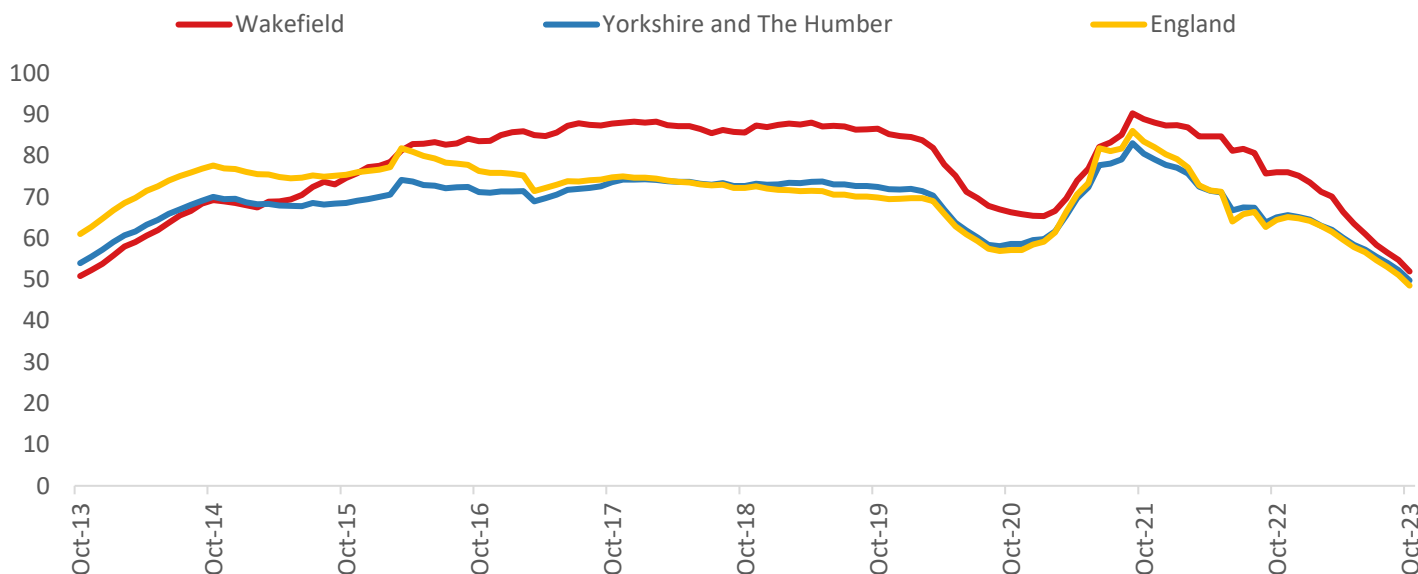

### Transactions (October 2023 data)

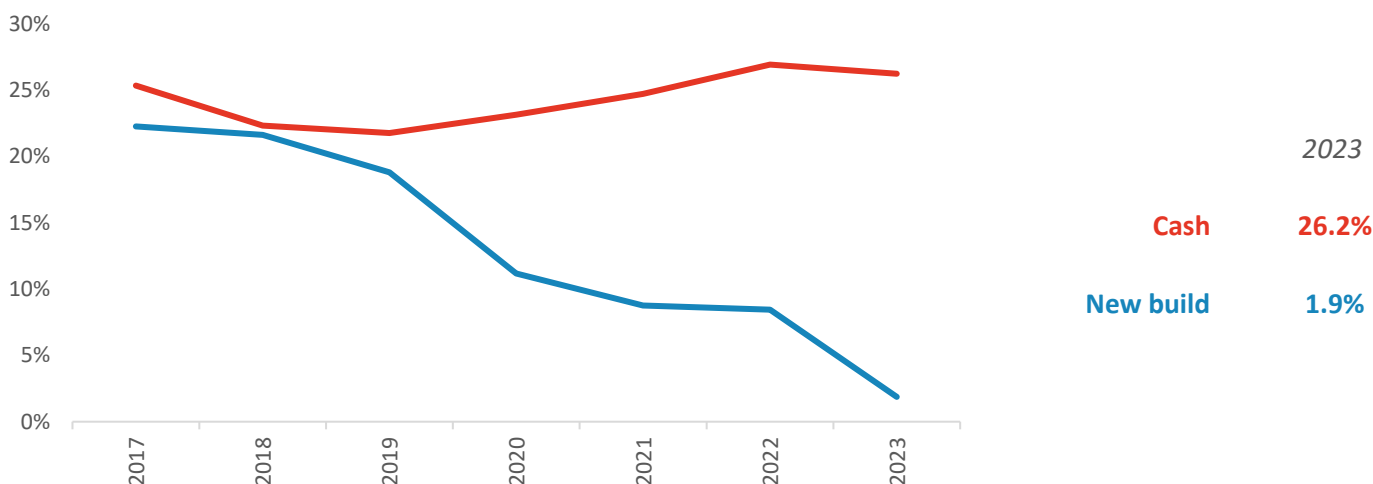
Annual Transactions, Indexed (2001-05 average = 100)



There were 3,487 transactions in Wakefield during the 12 months to October 2023. This is 52% of the average from 2001-05 and suggests activity is significantly below pre-downturn levels.

Transactions in Wakefield have fallen by 24.3% since 2014, compared to changes of -28.4% for Yorkshire and The Humber and -36.8% for England.

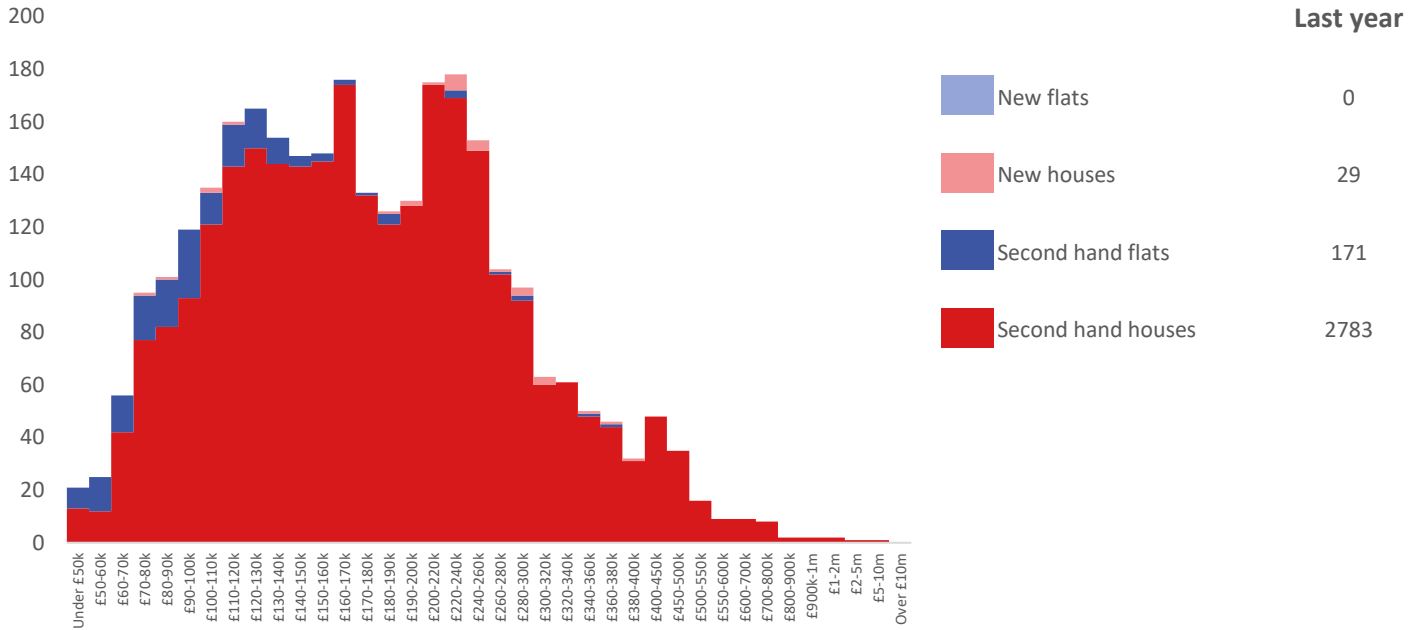
### Cash and New Build Sales as % of Total, by Year

### Depth of Market by Property Type

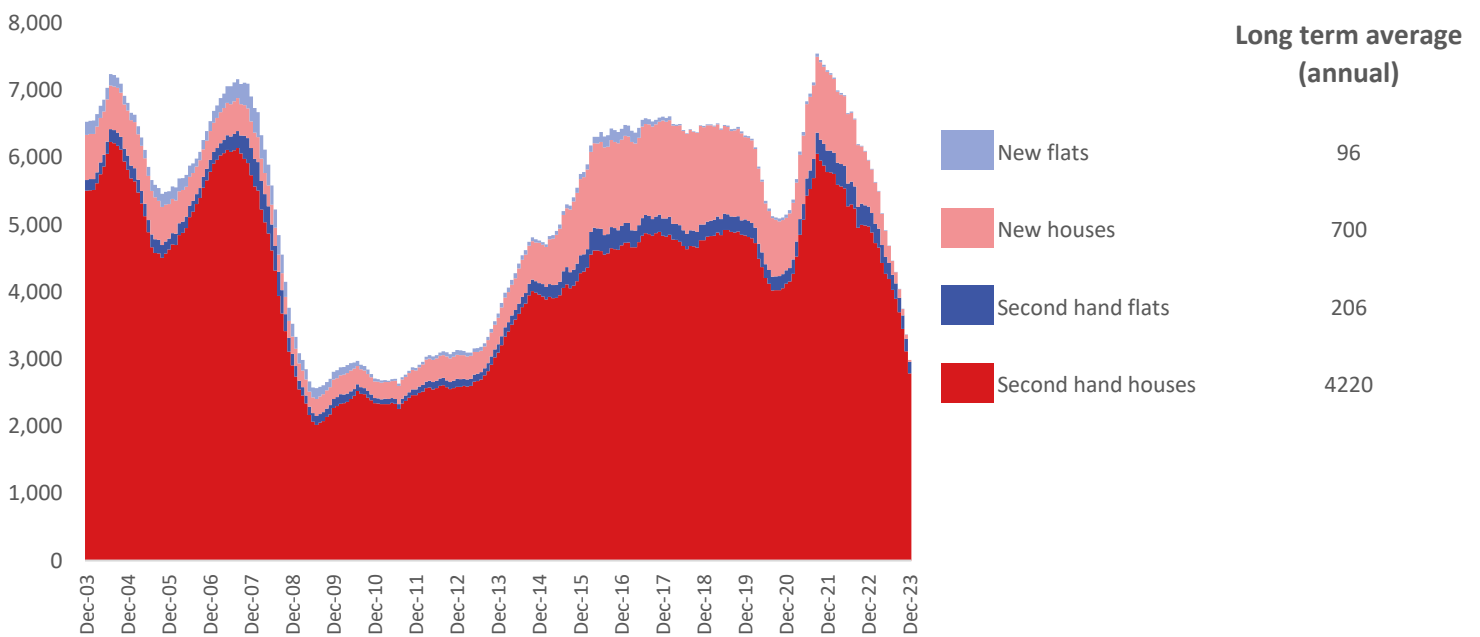
12 months to December 2023



The most common property type transacted over the past 12 months in Wakefield was 'second hand houses' with 2,783 sales, 93% of all sales over the same period. The annual total of 2,983 transactions is equivalent to 57% of the long term average level of activity.

### Timeline of Transactions by Type

Rolling 12 months, past 20 years



The most common property type transacted over the past 20 years was 'second hand houses' with the equivalent of 4,220 sales per year on average, making up 81% of the typical annual total over that period.
